



Project Success Story

Nicaragua

Since 2009, TGUP has built 28 new classrooms, libraries, kitchens, and learning resource centers at schools in Nicaragua. These are helping *thousands* of Nicaraguan students have a better chance to get a good education. **Over their expected lives (30+ years), they will help *more than a hundred thousand* students.**

At the El Paraiso School, the increase in student enrollment meant that preschool classes had to be held in the kitchen. Not only was the room unsuitable as a classroom, but the kitchen could no longer be used to prepare meals.

Working with our local partner, Seeds of Learning (SOL), we are able to keep the costs down by having local people (and TGUP volunteers) contribute the labor.
